Destination Map

Find accommodation in the North York Moors

Whether you need accommodation for a couple of nights or a week we have options to meet all your needs. The North York Moors has a generous supply of inns with rooms, farmhouse B&Bs and selfcatering holiday cottages. For something special, there are boutique to luxury spa hotels and several glamping options. We can help you find somewhere to stay in the North York Moors, whatever style of accommodation your customers require, and you'll be guaranteed a warm welcome. Many of our accommodation providers are walking, cycling, nature and dark skies 'friendly', meaning they feature information and facilities to help these activities. Getting to the North York Moors

The North York Moors is easily accessible from Europe. P&O Ferries operate an extensive service to Hull from Rotterdam. DFDS Seaways also operate ferries between Newcastle and Amsterdam. Both Hull and Newcastle are around a 90-minute drive to the North York Moors. Both also have train connections to Malton and Scarborough or Whitby, respectively. Alternatively, you can take a train from London to York (in around 2 hours) for onward travel to the North York Moors by bus or car hire.



Getting around the North York Moors

Once your customers have arrived there are several options for taking the train or local bus services, many serve the main towns and villages.

By train, the North Yorkshire Moors Railway offers a journey-back-in-time from Pickering to Whitby, through Newton Dale Gorge to Grosmont and along the pretty Esk Valley where it emerges at the sea. Voted the country's most popular heritage railway.

By bus, as well as connecting many of the small villages and towns the bus services pass through stunning countryside. Daily services include the Coastliner (Whitby to York), as well as the convenient coastal service between Guisborough and Scarborough, and an inland service from Helmsley to Scarborough.

By car, your customers will be able to explore the quieter roads. They are narrower and shared with other users - walkers, cyclists and sometimes sheep! Several villages have car parks.

On foot and by bike, walking and cycling are fantastic ways to experience the North York Moors National Park. There are plenty of day walks, circular and long distance walks offering through hikes, including the 175 km Cleveland Way National Trail. The 'Moor to Sea Cycleway Network' offers a stunning series of moorland loops, sections of offroad Cinder Track (former railway lines), quiet woodland tracks and bridleways of between 12 and 31km. Or for a long distance challenge, the North York Moors Cycleway offers 276 km of exhilarating riding. If this sounds challenging, e-biking is always an option!

Eating in the North York Moors

The North York Moors is not short of locally sourced, seasonal produce, cultivated by committed growers and brought to you by passionate producers. You'll find a wide choice of cafés serving lunches and amazing cakes, as well as food served in cosy pubs in front of blazing fires, through to fine dining options. Our itineraries give a few suggestions but for even more inspiration check out the Taste of the North York Moors.



Encounter the landscape on two feet

Walking here is all about fresh air, huge skies, and a chance to get close to wildlife local to the area. A great way to discover the history embedded in the landscape, from ancient monks' trods, to legendary stone crosses and boundary stones. The Cleveland Way National Trail, a 175 km long route through dramatic coastline and heather moorland guides you through the North York Moors on foot. The route can be taken as day walks, longer hikes or with an organised group.

Several baggage transfer companies and walking holiday companies operate on the Cleveland Way









Centuries of English History

Explore the North York Moors to uncover the centuries of English history that lie beneath your feet and before your eyes; discover fascinating stories of a land with an important past. From abbev ruins reflecting nearly 1,000 years of spiritual, commercial, and romantic history, magnificent castles dating back 900 years to fine historic houses and 18th century atmospheric coastal towns and villages, such as Whitby, Robin Hood's Bay or Staithes. There is even a magical heritage steam railway to take you on your North York Moors historical journey. Several monastic ruins -Whitby Abbey, Rievaulx and Mount Grace offer a wonderful insight into the past.

Wildlife spotting

The landscapes of North York Moors offer an abundance of opportunities for wildlife spotting and enjoying local flora and fauna. Whatever the season, there is something unique to see - head to the coast to see kittiwakes, razorbills, and puffins at RSPB reserve at Bempton and Yorkshire Wildlife Trust reserve at Flamborough. Look out for seal pups along the coast in June or November, while September is the best time to venture out to sea for some minke whale watching. Further inland, discover wildflower meadows and colourful heather moorland buzzing with insects, bees, and butterflies.

Boat trips to see seal, whales and dolphins (at the right time of year) can be taken from Whitby and Staithes

Uncover the geology of The Jurassic Coast

Explore the renowned coastline that regularly attracts amateur and professional geologists from all over the world. This unspoilt coastline has footprints and fossils from the Jurassic Age in the rocks at the water's edge, making it a rich fossil hunting location. The perfect place to seek your very own prehistoric souvenir, and one of the few places in the world to find it, the area's most well-known stone; black jet, formed from the remains of Jurassic monkey puzzle trees and made famous by Queen Victoria.

Any of the coastline along this 40 km stretch are worth a visit, but the beaches around Runswick Bay and Robin Hood's Bay are especially rewarding for amateur geologists to explore. Or join one of Hidden Horizon's fossil hunt or foraging walks.
